CONFIRMATION

The Sacrament of Confirmation

“The sacraments of Christian initiation – Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist – lay the *foundations* of every Christian life.”¹ Although each of these sacraments brings us a unique kind of grace, they are closely united and are all necessary for our complete initiation into the Church. In Baptism, our lives were radically changed: our sins were forgiven, we became a part of God’s family the Church, and we received sanctifying grace – God’s life within us. The Sacrament of Confirmation completes the grace we received at baptism.

Jesus promised His Apostles that He would send them His Holy Spirit. At Pentecost, the Apostles were filled with the Holy Spirit and then went forth to lay hands on those who had been baptized to share with them the gift of the Holy Spirit. This tradition is the origin of the Sacrament of Confirmation.² Therefore, this Sacrament gives us a share in the grace of Pentecost. At the celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation, the bishop lays his hands on the heads of those being confirmed, anoints them with a sacred chrism, and says, “Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit.”

The Sacrament of Confirmation brings about the following effects in our lives:³

- It deepens our identity as children of God.
- It unites us more firmly to Christ.
- It increases the gifts of the Holy Spirit in us.
- It unites us more perfectly with the Church.
- It gives us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and defend the faith by word and action as true witnesses of Christ, to confess the name of Christ boldly, and never to be ashamed of the Cross.

Confirmation Preparation Program

Immaculate Conception and St. Boniface each offer a two-year preparatory program for high school students seeking to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. Students must attend for a full two years to satisfy the program requirements. Our program is designed to not only prepare each student for Confirmation, but to also give them the tools they will need to continue to grow in their faith for the rest of their lives. Through a combination of classroom lessons, service projects, spiritual retreats, and personal prayer, students are led to a deeper relationship with God, so that they can confidently and whole-heartedly stand before the bishop at their Confirmation, seeking the gifts of the Holy Spirit and a strengthening of the grace conferred at Baptism.

Mass Attendance



The Eucharist is at the center of our lives as Catholics. At Mass, God becomes truly present in His Body and Blood for us to physically receive Him. In His great love, He desires to share His life with us. The Eucharist is truly a taste of heaven, where we will be united with God for all eternity.

Out of the wisdom of love, the Catholic Church requires that the faithful participate in the Mass every Sunday (or Saturday evening) and on Holy Days of Obligation. Attending Mass is the primary action in keeping the third commandment, which instructs us to keep holy the Lord's Day. The Church asks this commitment of us because she knows that we will be living life to the fullest if our lives are centered on the Mass.

The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin.⁴

Mass attendance on Sundays (or Saturday evenings) and on Holy Days of Obligation is required for all students preparing for Confirmation, as it is required for all Catholics. If a pattern of missing Mass is observed, a meeting will be arranged with the student and the parent(s) to assess the candidate's participation in the Confirmation preparation program.

Making the choice to attend Mass every week and worship the Lord is fundamental for growing and maintaining a healthy Catholic life. If weekly Mass attendance would be a change for you and your family, please consider this invitation to make the change and offer your teenager the opportunity to receive the graces of faithful Mass attendance and worship.

Mass times for area churches are provided at the end of this handbook to assist you in finding a Mass if your schedule conflicts with our parish Mass times.

Sacrament of Reconciliation

Jesus gave us the sacrament of Confession (or Reconciliation) when he breathed on the Apostles saying "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (John 20:22-23). Confession is the only ordinary means of forgiveness for mortal sins committed after baptism. Though other extraordinary means are possible, they are never guaranteed and should not be presumed upon.

Canon Law states that "After having reached the age of discretion, each member of the faithful is obliged to confess faithfully his or her grave sins at least once a year." (Canon 989). Although we are only required to go to Confession once a year, more frequent reception of this sacrament helps a person to grow in virtue and to root out sinful habits that endanger the soul and may lead one to commit mortal sin. It is also important to remember that we cannot receive Holy Communion if we have grave or mortal sin on our souls, and that "anyone conscious of a grave sin must receive the sacrament of Reconciliation before coming to communion." (CCC 1385)

Like all sacraments, the Sacrament of Reconciliation bestows an increase of grace, and it is a beautiful opportunity to receive God's love and mercy. Candidates for Confirmation should make it a practice to examine their conscience frequently and are encouraged to attend the sacrament of Reconciliation regularly, ideally once every month or two.

Daily Prayer

The definition of prayer is quite simply "talking to God." Just as any human relationship requires good communication, our relationship with God will not grow or deepen if we do not regularly communicate with Him through prayer. Prayer is our response to God's invitation to enter into the covenant of His love.

Through prayer we come to learn more about God and more about ourselves as His beloved creations, made in His image and likeness. Through prayers of blessing, adoration, petition, intercession, thanksgiving, and praise, we invite the Lord into our lives and give Him permission to work through us for His glory. Through the course of their formation, Confirmation candidates should begin to develop a personal routine of daily prayer.

Class Attendance

Because we have a limited number of teaching sessions, scheduled events, retreats and service projects, attendance is required for all students registered in the Confirmation preparation program. Class begins at 6:00 pm and ends at 7:15 pm. A class schedule with dates is available.

Missing Class: It is important that students attend all classes and complete all lesson materials over the course of their two years of preparation. Family emergencies, illness, and other circumstances beyond your control can arise during the year. Please contact the Faith Formation office to discuss any potential conflicts with the class schedule.

If your child will be absent from class, please notify the Faith Formation office no later than the Monday prior to class for planned absences, and as soon as possible for unplanned absences (illness, serious family emergency, etc.).

If a student misses a class, for any reason, make up work will be assigned according to the content of the missed class. Frequent absences or unsatisfactorily completed make-up assignments will be monitored, and if a pattern of missing work is observed, a meeting will be set up between the student, parents, and parish staff to work out a correction plan.

Students will not be permitted to leave class early without permission from their parents or guardians.

Missing Service Projects and Events: In the event of a scheduling conflict with a service project, event, or retreat, please contact the Faith Formation office to discuss this situation prior to the date.

Service Projects & Events

An important part of preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation is partaking in the communal life of the Church in various ways. “The human person needs to live in society. Society is not for him an extraneous addition but a requirement of his nature. Through the exchange with others, mutual service and dialogue with his brethren, man develops his potential; he thus responds to his vocation.”⁵ Love of neighbor is inseparable from love of God.

Individual Service Projects: Each student is asked to share in the life of our parish through regular participation in one of our volunteer ministries.

- Choir or Music Ministry
- Monthly Hospitality
- Maintain the Sign on the corner (St. Boni) – change weekly or every other week

- Other (must receive approval from Faith Formation office)

Lifeline: Lifeline is an event held at the NET Center in West St. Paul that includes music, Mass, a speaker, and Eucharistic Adoration. Join hundreds of other teens from around the Archdiocese to worship together and learn more about our faith. Attendance at one Lifeline each year is mandatory, but you are welcome and encouraged to attend more. Dates for the 2023-2024 year are:

One (1) Day NET Retreat: All first year Confirmation candidates are required to attend a one-day NET Retreat hosted at one of our parishes. This year's retreat will take place on Sunday, November 19th at Immaculate Conception. Second year Confirmation candidates are welcome and encouraged to attend the retreat but are not required to do so if they are registered for a weekend retreat.

Weekend Retreat: All second year Confirmation candidates should attend a two-day, or weekend-long retreat. We recommend attending a Confirmation retreat at the NET Center in West St. Paul. Students may choose to attend a different retreat, but all other retreats must receive approval from the Faith Formation office.

NET Weekend Retreat Details

Each NET weekend Confirmation retreat offers the opportunity for Adoration, Reconciliation, and Sunday Mass, as well as large group talks/presentations, small group discussions, games, skits, and more. Retreats have teens in attendance from throughout the Archdiocese and average 80-85 attendees each weekend. Each weekend begins at 8:15

am on Saturday morning and ends at 4:00 pm on Sunday afternoon (subject to change). The cost of the retreat is \$175.00. Financial aid is available – please contact the Faith Formation office as soon as possible if you are in need of financial assistance to attend the retreat. Information for Year 1 Candidates

Confirmation Sponsor

Confirmation students are asked to choose a Sponsor to accompany them on their faith journey leading up to Confirmation and beyond. First year candidates should choose their sponsor **by Wednesday, November 8th**, and sponsors should complete their Sponsor Information Form and submit it by **Wednesday, December 13th**. Your sponsor is encouraged to take an active part in your preparation for Confirmation. They will be invited to attend a class or two with you throughout your formation, join you in a service project, and of course attend your Confirmation!

What is a Confirmation sponsor?

A Confirmation sponsor is a companion and aid in living the Christian life who walks through the preparation for Confirmation with you. The sponsor presents you to the bishop to be confirmed. After your Confirmation, the sponsor helps you live out your baptismal promises faithfully. He or she should be a positive presence in your life who encourages you to become closer and closer to Jesus Christ and the Catholic Church.

What requirements must a Confirmation sponsor meet?

- Sponsors must be at least 16 years old and be mature enough to fulfill the responsibilities of this role.
- Sponsors must be practicing Catholics who have received all three Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist).
- Sponsors must be free from any impediment of law. Some examples of this include: the sponsor cannot have committed serious damage to faith and morals, cannot have hostilities against religion, and may not be in an irregular marriage (a marriage not recognized as a sacrament by the Church).

What should I look for when choosing a Confirmation sponsor?

You should look for a Catholic man or woman who will help you grow in your faith through his or her words and actions. Think of it as a mission: if you were searching for a treasure, you would want a guide with some experience to help you. As Catholics, we are all on a

mission and heaven is our treasure. In the Sacrament of Confirmation, we receive grace to help us on this mission. A Confirmation sponsor helps guide you to heaven.

Why is it suggested that I choose one of my godparents to be my Confirmation sponsor?

In order to understand what the Sacrament of Confirmation is all about, we must understand the Sacrament of Baptism. In Baptism, our lives are radically changed: our sins are forgiven, we become a part of God's family the Church, and we receive sanctifying grace – God's life within us. The Sacrament of Confirmation completes all of these gifts: we are united more firmly to Christ, the gift of the Holy Spirit is increased within us, and our bond with the Church is strengthened. So, what does this have to do with your Confirmation sponsor? At Baptism, you were given godparents whose role is very similar to that of a Confirmation sponsor. Your godparents are also guides to help you on your journey to heaven. To emphasize the unity between these Sacraments, it is appropriate that your Confirmation sponsor be one of your godparents.

Do I have to ask one of my godparents to be my sponsor?

No, it is not required that you ask one of your godparents to be your sponsor. If practical circumstances prevent you from choosing one of your godparents, it is understandable. Or even if you know someone who you think would be an excellent sponsor, it is acceptable to choose this person over your godparents. But make sure to at least consider asking one of your godparents to be your sponsor. Maybe this new relationship will strengthen the relationship you already have!

Can one of my parents be my Confirmation sponsor?

No, due to canon law a parent cannot be a sponsor.

What do I do once I have chosen my Confirmation sponsor?

Once you have asked someone to be your Confirmation sponsor and they have agreed, have them complete the Sponsor Information Form and get it signed by their pastor. By signing this form, they attest that they meet the requirements to be a sponsor and they agree to support you through prayer and example throughout your journey to Confirmation and beyond. The priest at their home parish also signs the form to confirm that they are a practicing Catholic in good standing with the Church.

Confirmation Saint

The tradition of choosing a patron Saint and using this Saint's name when being confirmed is a beautiful tradition. It is also acceptable to be confirmed using one's baptismal name. However, many students choose a Saint whom they admire to be their Confirmation Saint. As with your Confirmation sponsor, choosing your Confirmation Saint early allows you to develop your relationship throughout the process of preparation for Confirmation. Once you have selected a saint, you are encouraged to continue to learn about his/her life, and to pray often for his/her intercession. First year candidates should select a Confirmation saint no later than **Wednesday, January 10th**.

Information for Year 2 Candidates

Saint Paper

Each Year 2 Confirmation candidate is asked to write a 1-2 page reflection paper on why he/she has chosen this particular Saint. It would be appropriate to include a few pieces of information about the life of this Saint and what you can learn and imitate from this Saint's life. Reflection papers from Year 2 candidates are **due by Wednesday, January 10th**.

Test

Year 2 Confirmation students will take a test to evaluate their knowledge of and readiness to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. This test will be given several weeks prior to Confirmation. More information will be provided in the spring.

Interview

The Year 2 Confirmation students will have an individual interview with Father Peter to further prepare for their Confirmation. These interviews will take place during Faith Formation Class at **Immaculate Conception on March 13, 2024**, and at **St. Boniface on March 20, 2024**.

A Note Regarding Classes After Confirmation

It has long been customary in the Roman Catholic Church for children to receive the Sacrament of Baptism as infants, and to receive the other two sacraments of Initiation (Confirmation and Eucharist) later, after having reached the age of reason. In much of the United States, the current practice is to receive the Eucharist for the first time around the age of 7 and to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in middle or high school.

Unfortunately, for many youth, Confirmation often marks the end of formal Faith Formation, and can sometimes even be viewed as a graduation of sorts. While it is true that Confirmation completes a person's initiation into the Catholic Church, it is by no means a graduation in the sense that the newly Confirmed knows all they need to about the Faith. Rather, Confirmation strengthens and confirms the gifts of the Holy Spirit within them, giving them the tools and graces they can draw upon as they live out their life as soldiers for Christ.

In the weeks of class following Confirmation, students will explore how to activate the gifts they received in their Confirmation, and how to go about continuing to live out their faith in even deeper ways. **It is our expectation that all students will continue to attend scheduled classes through May 15th**. It is our sincere hope that students will continue to participate and become even more involved in the life of the parish after their Confirmation. We encourage each of our newly Confirmed to help in the development of our summer youth group and other opportunities to come that will be geared specifically toward our parishioners in upper high school.
